Tribal Epidemiology Centers (TECs)

- TECs established by Indian Healthcare Improvement Act (IHCIA) in 1996
- Public Health Authority (PHA)
 - Tribal inherent PHA of a sovereign
 - TEC PHA established by law 2010
- GAO report 2022
 - TRIBAL EPIDEMIOLOGY CENTERS: **HHS Actions Needed To Enhance** Data Access






Timeline of Events

Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA)

TECs established by IHCIA as a way to provide enhanced public health support to American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) peoples. TEC core funding is provided by the Indian Health Service.

IHCIA Permanently Reauthorized

TECs acknowledged as public health authorities granting access to AIAN data, data sets, monitoring systems, delivery systems, and other protected health information.



Best Practices in American Indian & Alaska Native Health TECs wrote the Best Practices Report to describe the

challenges in collecting,

accessing, analyzing and reporting health data for AIAN populations. It also describes the work that the TECs do, individually and collectively, to provide AIAN communities with the best public health surveillance and interpretation of health data.

Good Health and Wellness in Indian Country (GHWIC)

to improve health among AIAN people is the GHWIC program focused on preventing chronic disease through policy, systems,



Tribal Epidemiology Centers Public Health Infrastructure Program (TECPHI) Funded by the CDC, the TECPHI Program is funded to increase TEC capacity.

infrastructure, and sustainability activities in order to better meet the TEC seven core functions.

The CDC's largest investment and environmental changes.



Northwest Tribal Epidemiology Center (NWTEC)

- Core functions
- What data NWTEC collects
 - Federal and State Data
 - Demographic, cancer, substance use and overdose, hospitalization, cause of death, survey risk factor, diagnosis, preventative care, immunization data, and more
- Services provided to Tribes
 - Data linkage (AI/AN Misclassification)
 - Community Health profiles
 - Topic-specific reports
 - On-demand tribal data access





Collect Data

Public health authority collection of data for area Tribes, Tribal and urban Indian organizations



Evaluate

Evaluate delivery and data and other systems to improve Indian healthcare.



Assist

Provide assistance in identifying priority health status objectives and interventions to meet objectives.



Make recommendations

Make recommendations to Tribes, tribal and urban Indian organizations for targeting of services and delivery system improvements.



Provide Disease Surveillence and Technical Assistance

Provide disease surveillance and technical assistance to Tribes, tribal and urban Indian organizations as requested to promote public health.

Data Sharing Agreement


What is a Data Sharing Agreement (DSA)?

- Allows for collaboration between the Tribe and NWTEC.
- Supports sovereignty of Tribes, NPAIHB strategic planning, and data governance policies.
- Outlines NWTEC's responsibilities.
- Tailored to each Tribe's needs.

• Identifies Tribe's Authorizing Official.








Data Hub Addendum

- Describes access, ownership, and confidentiality.





Data Exchange Addendum

What does the Data Exchange Addendum do?

- Establishes purpose and term for NWTEC to provide technical assistance to the Tribe.
- Describes data and workplan/goal.
- Identifies access and points of contact.
- Ensures tribal ownership, nondisclosure, security and confidentiality of data.




Expedited Technical Assistance

- Provides streamlined access to data and resources to benefit Tribes.
- Technical Assistance
 - Tribal Area data related to a specific topic of interest.
 - Direct access to Tribal Area data via the NW Tribal Data Hub.
 - Tribal data analysis through data exchange.
